Co-Chairs Maroney and Borer, Vice-Chairs Abrams and Boyd, Ranking Members Logan and Vail, and Members of the Veterans' Affairs Committee:

Thank you for this opportunity to present testimony on behalf of the Connecticut Land Conservation Council (CLCC) in opposition to **House Bill No. 7136, An Act Exempting Veterans from the Passport to the Parks Motor Vehicle Registration Program.**

As the State's umbrella organization for the land conservation community, including its 137+ land trusts, CLCC advocates for land conservation, stewardship, and funding, and works to ensure the long-term strength and viability of the land conservation community in Connecticut.

Enacted in late 2017, the Passport to the Parks program generates dedicated revenues to support the operation and maintenance of Connecticut State Parks, Forests and Wildlife Management Areas. Supported through a \$10 biennial fee that is applied through the Connecticut Department of Motor Vehicles to registration of non-commercial vehicles, the Passport program provides Connecticut residents access to all State Parks for free, while helping to restore and support park services such as campgrounds, lifeguards and hours of operation at certain parks and nature centers.

One of the state's top tourism destinations, Connecticut State Parks are worth the investment -- attracting approximately 9 million visitors every year; generating over \$1 billion annually for the state's economy; and supporting over 9,000 private sector jobs.

While sensitive to the nature of the request, CLCC is concerned that carving out an exemption from the fee for one category of users, will lead to a "slippery slope" of requests from others, thereby undermining the efficacy of the program. At a time when the state is seeking alternative solutions to address budget shortfalls, we respectfully urge the Committee to leave the fee structure for this dedicated source of revenue intact.
