Keith R. Ainsworth, Managing Member, Law Offices of Keith R. Ainsworth, Esq., LLC— Keith Ainsworth has been an environmental and land use litigator for over three decades. He has a broad conservation-based practice representing land trusts, non-profits, land owners and businesses in transactions and litigation throughout Connecticut before administrative agencies and state and federal courts. As former chair of the CT Bar Association Environmental Law section, Acting Chair of the CT Council on Environmental Quality and a municipal first selectman (Haddam), Keith has perspective from several sides of the table. A graduate of Tufts with a B.S. in biology, environmental studies and English literature, Keith brings a scientific and analytical background to the law. Keith is a life member of the Madison Land Conservation Trust and served on the national leadership council of Trout Unlimited. He busies himself with preserving open space in town and preserving butterflies in the museum. His field work with butterflies contributed almost a thousand citations to the recently published Connecticut Butterfly Atlas. He has contributed articles to scientific publications and his mark-recapture studies with Swallowtail butterflies was recently cited in the book Swallowtails of the Americas. During the Pandemic he is doing a pollinator survey of two meadows in Redding CT. Recent butterfly study trips with his spouse Roanna , a photographer have been several times to Amazon forest in Guyana, Nicaragua, and yearly studies in montane California assessing the impact of climate change on that fauna. During warmer weather she is likely to be seen in a kayak with other volunteers surveying, pulling, and removing invasive water chestnut or yellow Flag iris, or cutting Japanese knotweed at a test site she oversees on the banks of Whalebone Creek. Diana is also busy locally as a member of the Lyme Land Trust's Events & Education Committee, Lyme's SustainableCT certification committee, the Lyme Pollinator Pathway, and the St. Ann's Episcopal Church Environment Committee, co-chairing the church's growing pollinator/native gardens throughout the campus. She has been passionate about all things natural since growing up on a dairy farm in Sussex, England, joining garden clubs and volunteering as an enthusiastic weeder in various hometowns as an adult, and gaining her Master Gardener certification from UConn in 2012.
